Guest Speaker

Lynne Gibson introduced Colette Hall who is the current Neighbourhood Support (NHS) Advisor employed by the Napier City Council (NCC). Our NHS is one of 70 Support Groups throughout NZ and has 200,000 people signed up nationwide.

They are partnered and sponsored by Police, Fire & Emergency (FENZ), Civil Defence, & St. John Ambulance. The aim is to know your neighbours by supporting them in the event of a disaster or emergency.

Locally NHS are looking at several projects currently including safe care for multicultural residents, crime awareness and smoke alarm placement in homes. NHS liaise with street coordinators to organise street events including BBQs and maintain the member database which is free of charge to join. Crime prevention locally is also linked to Brent Smith who is our Community Constable.



Following Cyclone Gabrielle and a review, Emergency Hubs are now being set up rurally identifying where to meet and there will be satellite phones to communicate with Emergency Management as issues arise. Roger Morrison is the Greenmeadows advisor and can be contacted at NCC. NHS have a Facebook page that is continually updated.

Colette has previously worked with London Fire Brigade, EIT, Health HB and now our Council as Community and Project Advisors . It was very interesting to see what is happening with Neighbourhood Support and updated progress post Cyclone Gabrielle. She is also a volunteer with Fire and Emergency.

Ian Holyoake pointed out the Greenmeadows Rotary "connection" with NHS for our own Brian Hall held the same (or similar) role to our speaker many years back. Graeme Ryan thanked the speaker.



THE PASSING OF A PAST ROTARY WORLD PRESIDENT



Expanding on the report from PDG Ross Pinkham above, we record here the peaceful passing (here in Napier) of Past Rotary International President Bill Boyd on the day of our meeting (22 January 2025). Some of his history is set out here.

Bill Boyd served as President of Rotary International during the 2006-2007 Rotary year. His dedication to Rotary spanned over three decades, during which he held numerous significant roles, including:

- Rotary Foundation Regional Coordinator for Australia and New Zealand (1989-1991)
- Chair of the Regional Magazine Editors Conference (1992 and two subsequent occasions)
- Member & later Chairperson of the Rotary International Communications Committee (from 1993)
- Rotary International Director (1998-2000), serving as Treasurer in 1999-2000
- Trustee of the Rotary Foundation (2008-2012), serving as Chairperson in 2011-2012
- Chair of the Branding Committee (2012-2014)
- Chair of the Water and Sanitation Rotarian Action Group (2012-2018)
- Chair of the Peace Programmes Overview Committee (2018-2019)

In recognition of his outstanding service, Bill received the Rotary Foundation's *Distinguished Service Award* and *Citation for Meritorious Service*, as well as a *Distinguished Service Award* from *Rotary Down Under*. He was honoured with the *Queen's Service Order* for Community Service in the 2007 New Zealand New Year's Honours List, and was made a *Companion of the New Zealand Order of Merit* in 2013. Both Bill and Lorna were awarded the *Royce and Jean Abbey Foundation award* in 2024. A dedicated Rotarian, Bill was also a multiple Paul Harris Fellow.

Editor's Note:

Bill was a Rotarian first in Wellington and then later in Auckland. He was only the second New Zealander to hold the office of RI World President. By coincidence he had shifted from Auckland to Napier in this past week to be closer to family members, and was about to move into Summerset Palms Retirement Village. Now his wife Lorna will do that alone. Were he to have survived, perhaps he would have joined our Club!

The creation of the International Association of Rotary Clubs in 1912

The creation of the International Association of Rotary Clubs in 1912 was a milestone in the history of the movement.

This decision followed Rotary's rapid expansion beyond its original borders, with the founding of clubs in Canada and Britain.

The Association was established at the convention in Duluth, Minnesota, bringing together representatives from 50 clubs.

This formal structure aimed to unify and coordinate the activities of existing clubs, while facilitating the creation of new clubs internationally.

Chesley Perry, appointed secretary of the Association, played a key role in its development.

Under his leadership, Rotary has established common standards and procedures, strengthening its identity and cohesion.

This internationalization has required adjustments, particularly in the governance and representation of non-American clubs.

The Association has faced the challenge of maintaining unity while respecting the cultural diversity of its members.

The creation of the International Association laid the foundation for modern Rotary.
