SURPRISE GUEST SPEAKERS – YOUTH EXCHANGE

Helen introduced our recently arrived Rotary Youth Exchange stu-

dent, Alice Wender. Alice, from the south of Brazil, told the members a little about herself and presented President Chris with a banner from her sponsoring Rotary club in Canela, the town she is from and a book about the history of Canela (in Portuguese but as Helen pointed out, we all probably have Google translate on our phones!) Alice will give us a full presentation in the coming weeks.



Helen then introduced our (main) guest speaker, Bianca Ching. Bianca was sponsored by our club to go on exchange in January 2024

to Basel in South West Switzerland. She returned home two weeks ago and is about to head off to Otago University where she

will be studying Law, International Business and German.

Bianca gave us an overview of her exchange year. After a stopover in Dubai with all the other exchange students from NZ, Bianca arrived in Switzerland speaking very little German so it was full immersion when she started school. She found that the Swiss people are quite reserved and so it fell upon her to make the first move and approach other students. It took her five months to make strong friendships. Students take 12 compulsory subjects at Swiss schools and with the school day running from 8am to 6pm, it was very intense.

Bianca had an amazing first host family who took her on lots of trips, from skiing in

the Swiss Alps, to visiting Spain and Italy. A highlight of her year in Switzerland was the Euro tour with 11

Christmas was spent alone - her host family were away - but Bianca had an amazing time with all her Swiss friends who made it a memorable time for her. She visited the Lindt factory, even though she doesn't eat chocolate herself!

One of the things that Bianca wanted to do while on exchange was to take advantage of Basel's close proximity to the French and German borders and eat a meal in all three countries in one day. She didn't manage to achieve this, but did cycle to all three countries in one day and spent the rest of the week recovering! Bianca shared that the highlights of her fun, busy, hectic exchange year were all the amazing people that she met and the memorable experiences that she had.
