GUEST SPEAKER - Jo McDougal

Steve Gillum introduced Jo McDougal who had addressed the club on

a previous occasion about adventures in Mongolia (or some such place). This time he told us he had just returned from a sixmonth stint in Antarctica as a Field Mechanic on the Ross Ice Shelf traverse. Jo told us about SWA!S2C, which is the study of the west Antarctic ice sheet to 2 degrees Celsius of warming. Part of Jo's work was to maintain the many vehicles that



are

used in the ice. With a Power Point, Jo described the difficulty of being in a 24-hour sunlight environment, so care had to be taken with sleeping when they were in cabins. He also explained that any rescues done by plane, required fuel to be "positioned" all over the continent for refuelling. Fuel travels by NZ Navy vessels to McMurdo and then the Americans tow the fuel in big bladders across the ice. Kitchen and

In question time Jo's mother asked how qualified the medic was, so it highlighted the great work the Ice team do, albeit dangerous at times. Jo presented a framed flag from the ice, to our Rotary which will be a reminder to the wonderful work that is done in the Antarctica.

It was a very interesting talk about a region that remains a mystery to most of us but satisfying to see the work done between New Zealand and USA to study this wonderful continent.

Further Paul Harris Presentation

PDG Ian Holyoake recalled his earlier days as a District Governor and making presentations of Paul Harris Fellowships. Acknowledging the earlier "award" to Garth Eyles for his amazing club contribution, Ian pointed out that when the awards were originally created, it was to acknowledge "donations" by Rotarians and that there were various levels reflecting the amounts given. Only a small number of countries use the recognition as an "honour". But it does not matter whether we call it an "award", a "reward" or a "recognition". What really counts is that it acknowledges US\$1000 be-



ing paid to our charity, and for "Doing Good in the World." In that light he had great pleasure presenting PDG Ross Pinkham with a PHF + 2 ruby pins which acknowledged a total of US\$8000 being given in Ross' name. Ross himself explained that some five of these had been "awarded" to him and three were from his own donations – which included the value of the meals prepaid and not eaten due to his occasional apologies. Ross also acknowledged a total of \$US156,000 had been donated by Greenmeadows to the Rotary Foundation over the years.

Rotary's response to the U.S.'s plan to withdraw from the WHO, USAID funding freeze

Rotary remains committed to eradicating polio, despite the U.S. decision to withdraw from the WHO, a key partner in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI).

As a founding GPEI partner, Rotary has worked for decades with governments and organizations to reduce polio cases by 99.9% since 1988.

The organization remains dedicated to protecting every child, even in the most remote and challenging regions.

Rotary is confident that GPEI will continue to adapt, innovate, and ensure vaccine accessibility worldwide.

Additionally, Rotary's collaboration with USAID has been affected by a stop-work order, impacting various projects, including the Hearts of Europe initiative.

Rotary has informed those involved and is working on alternative funding solutions to support ongoing efforts.

Despite these challenges, Rotary remains resolute in achieving a polio-free world.

Having eradicated smallpox, humanity can now ensure polio becomes the second disease eliminated globally, fulfilling the long-standing promise of a healthier future for all.
