#### SUMMER SCIENCE SCHOOL SPEAKERS

**Youth Director Gill** introduced our first two guest speakers, Emily Lloyd and Kyah Ingram, Year 13 students from Tamatea High School, nominated by our club and who both attended the 2025 Rotary Science & Technology Forum, a two-week science school held at Auckland University, in conjunction with AUT and Massey.

Emily and Kyah shared an amazing presentation about their time at the science school, held in January. Both girls are now inspired to aim high and apply to study at university. Emily is hoping to do a BSc in Health Science and will be the first member of her



family to attend university. Kyah is hoping to study BSc in psychology and will also be the first member of her family to not only attend university but also to complete 13 years of education. Emily and Kyah attended different modules with subjects ranging from robotics, chemistry and physics to biomedical science, biology and psychology. The modules were a mix of lectures and hands on experiments. There were also tech visits to the Liggins Institute, the Biomed Imaging Research centre and the Cancer research Centre for Brain research. The girls got to do things like dissect and sex mussels, dissect a human heart and learn about the use of plasma thrusters to move satellites in space.

It wasn't all about academia though. There was an equal balance between learning and social, with opportunities to try rock climbing, play volleyball and attend a disco with the theme of gender bender where the male attendees wore dresses and the females male clothing. Both Emily and Kyah were very grateful to the Club to be able to have the opportunity to attend the science forum.



A total of 168 students were successful in being selected to attend from across the whole of NZ. Going to the science forum has had a huge impact on both girls and has inspired them immensely. Emily has now applied and been accepted, to attend a science forum *in the UK* in

July with applicants from all over the world! She will spend time at both Oxford and Cambridge Universities. Emily has to raise \$10,000 to attend this prestigious event and has already managed to raise \$5000 towards her trip.

Alan White thanked both Emily and Kyah for sharing their amazing and life changing

experiences at the science forum. He commented that they embody what Rotary is all about - they have embraced the opportunity and changed as a result.

#### DISTRICT GOVERNOR NICK DANGERFIELD

Our second speaker DG Nick Dangerfield was introduced by Ross Pinkham. Nick, an accountant in his day time employment and married to Maria for the 11 years, is a member of Tauranga Te Papa Rotary club and has held a number of roles at district level including the training portfolio which he passed on after becoming DG. Nick talked about this year's theme — "The Magic of Rotary" and explained where International Rotary President Stephanie A Urchick got her inspiration from. He asked members what the opposite of success is. Not failure as many of us thought, but giving up. Nick suggested that clubs should do less - not spread ourselves too thinly, and so be more successful.

We need to get the Rotary brand out there in the community and have an action plan. The first priority on the plan should be to increase our impact, the second to expand our reach. Thirdly we should be enhancing participant engagement - ask members what THEY want to do - ask what people's passions




are and talk together as a club, having good conversations. And fourthly increase our ability to adapt. Nick acknowledged that Rotary has a retention problem and we need to adapt to change or we will become irrelevant.

Nick also talked about Regionalisation. A big change to how Rotary operates and a chance for us to change Rotary, an opportunity to create and form our own type of Rotary experience here in the South Pacific. The new model is club focused with access to resources which empower members to get their own answers. The focus is on more flexibility and less hierarchy. The aim is to increase our impact and reach by working collaboratively with other clubs in our area. We have to try these things to see if they work. He explained that the role of DG is to continue to support the clubs in the district, promote and support Rotary Foundation, reminding members that with its district and global grants, this should be the charity of choice for clubs.

Nick touched on the district conference, to be held in Rotorua in May, and also spoke about this year's DG charity of choice *Think and Be Me*. This charity is a Rotary supported programme aimed at providing a robust fence at the top of the cliff instead of an ambulance at the bottom for mental health in primary aged children, bringing preventative skills to address issues before they become a problem, giving children coping mechanisms and strategies. He finished with a quote from Paul Harris, "Whatever Rotary may mean to us, to the world it will be known by the results it achieves"
