this week, reminded us of Cyclone Gabrielle (which seriously affected both himself and the guest speaker). He then sought to elicit various facts on the time, date, place and name of the event, as well as the rainfall millimeters, people displaced or deceased, financials and different coloured stickers. While our feelings for him continued, our pockets were emptied into the fine bowl.



Guest-Speaker

Club Member Bill Hawkins was introduced by Pres. Chris and on taking the rostrum, he noted the presence of his friend who was attending after reading our Facebook page. He also spoke of his "Kitchen

Project" with Clive and was then finally dragged to his topic which was about Model A Fords (has owned three) and his longest owned "yellow" one that went down with Cyclone Gabrielle!

e spoke of Henry Ford, of the history surrounding this early model of car, that it was designed to be built (or fixed) with a screw driver and crescent spanner. Five million of them were made and the NZ



ones arrived in boxes. They were cheap, had big wheels & suited our metal roads. Some of them were converted to trucks (*maybe the first Ford F150 or Ranger! Ed.*) Bill's interest was fired by his father's one, and Bill bought his first one when he was at university, but later had to sell it due to his "other interest," a girl he had met at that time and wanted to marry (he had to pay for the engagement ring!)

n graduation he came to Hawkes Bay, did up a house (*must have had money left over from the ring. Ed*) and then (1973) decided he wanted another Model A. This one was a real "doer upper". He described the problems with finding the various parts, including a hood (cost a bottle of gin) headlights and four doors (free & delivered in a sugar bag!) Finally reconstructed, it was painted yellow & black (not original) did 50,000 miles and lasted up until Cyclone Gabrielle. He lost five cars (including another Model A) but only the yellow car could be restored. It will be finished in about six months.

Bob Morrison thanked the speaker & provided a bottle of Janola and water to assist with the final car restoration.

ROTARY INTERNATIONAL - COUNCIL ON LEGISLATION

What is it, where is it?

About 480 Rotary members from around the world, each representing a single Rotary district, are gathering this week at the Hyatt Regency in Chicago, Illinois, USA, for the 2025 Council on Legislation. They will vote on 78 proposals to change Rotary International's constitutional documents.

"This Council represents the heart of Rotary's democratic process and the best of our international spirit," said Rotary International President Stephanie A. Urchick at the opening session. "The gathering is one of Rotary's most powerful expressions of multiculturalism. Here, voices from every corner of the globe come together – not to compete, but to collaborate."

The Council on Legislation, which meets every three years, is Rotary's version of a congress. Representatives selected by their districts gather to consider proposals designed to move Rotary forward and adapt to the changing times.

And our man is there. PDG Ross Pinkham is the District 9930 Representative







One of the things they have done.....Council on Legislation approves dues increase

Rotarians from all over the world met in Chicago, Illinois, USA 13-17 April to vote on the rules governing Rotary clubs. Representatives considered more than 75 proposals. The Council approved an increase in the dues that all members pay to Rotary International each year through 2028-29. The Board argued the increases were needed to keep providing valuable programs and services to members. The Council also approved allowing clubs to charter with as few as 15 members instead of 20. First Arab woman Nobel laureate to speak at Rotary 2025 Convention

Tawakkol Karman, the first Arab woman to win the Nobel Peace Prize, will speak at Rotary International's 2025 convention in Calgary, Canada.

A journalist and human rights activist, Karman has long fought for democracy and women's empowerment in Yemen, enduring persecution and imprisonment for her activism.

From 2007 to 2011, she organized protests against President Ali Abdullah Saleh's regime, earning the nicknames "mother of the revolution" and "the iron woman."

She founded Women Journalists Without Chains to support press freedom and promote women's rights.

During the Arab Spring, Karman called for peaceful dialogue and worked toward unity between Sunni and Shia Muslims.

She believes Islam supports full participation of women in society and peaceful coexistence with other religions.

Recognized globally, she was named one of Time's 100 Women of the Year in 2011 and listed among Foreign Policy's Top 100 Global Thinkers.

Her foundation builds schools and supports healthcare and poverty relief in Yemen.
