Upper Hutt Rotary had put up around \$2000 but in approaching the Warehouse for gifts, received a discount which made the amount worth \$3000. The proposal is that we fund a similar venture here. PDG Ross then outlined his recent experience as the District Council on Legislation representative and his attendance at the meeting in Chicago last month. He told us that some 86 remits were debated, (especially by Japan & India) that there were 500 delegates and eight languages used. Some items of note that were "passed" included there now being only 15 members needed for a new (previously 20), that district



conferences are no longer compulsory, and that the annual membership dues have gone up! He also referred to his visit to Rotary International HQ at Evanston, Chicago, and his personal meeting with the World President *Stephanie Urchick*. He concluded his report with a personal presentation to Pres. Chris, and Pres. Elect Carol, with Rotary scarves depicting the "themes" for their years and then acknowledged previous Council members present, PDGs Roger Miller & Ian Holyoake.

Three Minute Speaker



This monthly spot was filled by "newish" member **Peter Manson** who was pleased to explain his background. This was especially so in the light of he and John Waldin (who joined about the same time) being often confused with each other (in the bulletin particularly) and so he was able to "set the record straight!" The initial philosophy of Rotary

Rotary's original philosophy, as conceived by Paul Harris, was based on a unique balance between community service and professional networking.

The central idea was to create a space where businessmen and professionals could build friendly relationships while helping each other in their respective activities.

Paul Harris firmly believed that these personal connections would foster stronger business ethics and a greater sense of social responsibility.

The pioneers of Rotary thus placed the concept of service at the heart of their project.

Rather than limiting themselves to the sole pursuit of profit, they intended to put their skills and resources at the service of the common good, thus contributing to the improvement of life in their respective cities.

The concept of "Service Above Self" was not yet formalized, but the idea of contributing to the well-being of the community was already present.

The weekly meetings, alternating between members' workplaces, aimed to promote mutual understanding of different professions and encourage ethical business exchanges.
